6 Bills for NY Kids are waiting for Gov. Cuomo's signature. YOU CAN PUSH 2 FORWARD!

The 2020-21 legislative session that ended on June 10th brought many policy improvements for children across Westchester County and New York State.

The state legislature passed bills that are being sent to the Governor to be signed into law on critical issues impacting children and families including child poverty, youth criminal justice, early childhood services, and child care.

Child Poverty

S.2755-C (Ramos)/A.1160-C (Bronson) requires New York State to publicly commit to cut child poverty by 50% over 10 years with a focus on racial equity. This bill will create a Child Poverty Reduction Advisory Council, which will ensure New York State meets its goal.

This bill is the result of advocacy from the Child Poverty Reduction Core Group, which WCA joined in September 2020. The bill's Advisory Council will build a statewide policy agenda to reduce child poverty and foster increased data transparency focused on yearly changes in child poverty rates.

Youth Criminal Justice

S.4051 (Bailey)/A.4982 (Hevesi) stops the arrest and prosecution of elementary school aged children (with exceptions for only the most extreme situations), in favor of an expanded system of local, community-based services that will help close the school-to-prison pipeline and address racial disparities in our youth justice system.

S.282 (Myrie)/A.6769 (Hyndman) expands second chance Youthful Offender record sealing opportunities to individuals who developed criminal records as teenagers but have successfully reintegrated into society.

These 2 bills are outstanding pieces of youth justice reform that did not pass in the 2017 Raise the Age legislation. Both pieces of legislation make progress towards our goal of aligning criminal justice policies with brain science and the principles of youth development. There is still work to be done for emerging adults ages 18 to 25.

Child Care

S.5162 (Brisport)/ A.5840 (Clark) allows child care providers to access direct deposit to receive payment as a way to alleviate long delays in payment from county partners providing child care funding.

S.7128 (Brisport)/ A.7721-A (Clark) extends the term and expands the scope of the Child Care Availability Task Force, which will improve both child care funding approaches and access to child care throughout the state.

These bills advance us towards our goal of making child care more affordable and accessible for parents and financially viable for child care providers. It is our hope that the Child Care Availability Task Force will help us make even greater progress in the future.

Early Childhood Services

S.5560-A (Reichlin-Melnick) /A.5339 (Paulin) creates a Covered Lives fund of \$40 million from insurance companies that will make it easier for young children with special needs and developmental delays to access Early Intervention (EI) services.

S.6516-A (Mannion)/ A.8013 (Benedetto) matches preschool special education payment growth rates with general education school funding growth rates, setting a stronger foundation for children with developmental delays and special needs and the early educators they work with.

Establishment of the Covered Lives Fund will address the statewide delay in delivery of timely Early Intervention (EI) services to our youngest residents. We highlighted Westchester's EI delays as exceeding the state average in our 2019 Data Bulletin. This is a major step forward.
